Japanese classical literature (medieval literature/narrative literature/Buddhist literature), historical document studies

Brief explanation regarding specialization

I research what people who lived in medieval times were thinking and how they lived. In particular, I cover the content and methods through which practitioners of Buddhism (as in, priests), study scripture and doctrine. There is no shortage of written works that Buddhist priests have left behind. In this class, we will analyze those works and get to the bottom of how medieval people lived and thought. Japanese classical literature studies is a discipline for pondering what made people who lived in a society and espoused values different than our today laugh or cry. While Japanese classical literature tends to be associated with high school courses, classical literature in universities involves approaching the world of that literature on a more realistic level. It is research in which you will examine how people of yesteryear lived while applying information from all kinds of fields, including history, the arts, Buddhism and schools of thought.

I invite you to try engaging the mysteries of classical literature alongside me.

Specialization

Heian period literature

Brief explanation regarding specialization

I conduct research on the language in literary works written in hiragana characters from the Heian period, such as "The Tale of Genji." In materials from that period, it is not uncommon for "words" belonging to that era to be unaccompanied by explanations of what they mean. For that reason, it is necessary to infer and verify those meanings based on examples of how those "words" and language are used and the context of that usage. I seek to update interpretations of literary works through such research on language.

Brief explanation regarding specialization

Edo-period Japanese literature

Brief explanation regarding specialization

I research literature from Japan's Edo period, particularly covering tanka poetry and poets from the mid-Edo period up through the late Edo period and Meiji period. Literature from the Edo period formed itself by alternately inheriting the knowledge and culture cultivated over time under preexisting culture and breaking down that knowledge and culture. The same goes for Edo-period tanka poetry, which developed in various forms while either inheriting or breaking down tradition. My interests include tackling the questions of how tanka poetry from the Edo period was positioned given that poetry's long history and what kind of attitudes poets from the late Edo period and Meiji period had in composing their poems.



Recently, I have taken an interest in the linguistic policies of indigenous peoples and foreign government advisors during the early Meiji period.
